A map is a family of polygons -called faces- such that: any two faces meet in a common edge or vertex, or do not meet at all; each edge belongs to precisely two faces; the faces containing a given vertex form a single cycle of faces (sharing a common edge); and between any two faces there is a chain of adjancent faces. In this talk we'll consider maps whose automorphism group is transitive on vertices, edges and faces. (Received February 17, 2006)
